#### New Security Protocol at Gates Driver's License or approved Identification Now Required for Non-Blue Skies Decal Holders

In a move aimed at bolstering security, all personnel entering Blue Skies facilities will now be required to present a valid driver's license or approved Identification if they do not possess a Blue Skies vehicle decal. The change, effective Sunday, **November 1**, comes as part of a broader effort to streamline gate access and ensure the safety of our residents, workforce and property.

#### Why the Change?

The new rule is intended to provide an additional layer of verification for those without the Blue Skies decal, which previously allowed for quicker entry through gate checkpoints. We've always taken security seriously, but as we grow, it's essential that we tighten access control to prevent unauthorized entry. This change will ensure that only personnel who are properly vetted can access the facility.

#### What You Need to Know

- 1. *Who Does This Affect?* Anyone without a Blue Skies vehicle decal, including visitors, contractors, and temporary employees, must now present a valid driver's license upon arrival.
- 2. *What About Those with Decals?* Residents, employees and regular contractors with a Blue Skies decal are unaffected by this change. Their decals will still provide seamless entry.
- 3. **Possible Temporary Inconveniences** While the new protocol aims to improve long-term security, there may be some initial delays as the new system is implemented. Drivers are encouraged to have their licenses readily available to expedite the process.

#### **Future Adjustments Possible**

Additional updates to the security system could follow, with reviews planned regularly to assess the effectiveness of the new measures. Blue Skies encourages all personnel to comply with the new rules and remain patient during the transition phase.

#### Employee Appreciation Fund ~ BST West Resident Council

It has been a long-standing tradition for Blue Skies' residents to express an additional "Thank You" to its hourly employees through gifts to the Employee Appreciation Fund. Your gifts qualify as donations to the Air Force Villages Charitable Foundation, and as such, will be included in your annual statement of donations next January. You can participate by placing a check (preferable to cash) into the slot marked "Employee Appreciation Fund" on the side of the Front Desk area, or by making arrangements with Finance to add a specific amount to your monthly service statement, one-time or ongoing. These funds are distributed twice a year, i.e., in early June and early December, to all qualifying, hourly-paid employees. Beauty Salon employees are the only exception, as they are the only employees allowed to receive tips. The cutoff for donations to be applied to the upcoming semi-annual Appreciation Fund distribution is Friday, November 15 at noon. You may leave checks at the Front Desk or take them to the Corporate Office; they should be made payable to AFVCF (Air Force Villages Charitable Foundation), with "Employee Appreciation Fund" on the comment line. Please note as well that these gifts are classified as charitable because they are applied to the entire pool of hourly employees, i.e., we are unable to forward a particular donation to an individual hourly staff member, nor a small group of employees (in Dining Services, at The Mission, etc.). Finally, in terms of your donation's impact: Along with hourly staff you see day in and day out, such as wait staff, housekeepers, custodians, Front Desk clerks, courtesy officers, and Maintenance technicians, there are also behind-the-scenes employees who benefit from this fund, including cooks and utility workers, Finance clerks, overnight Front Desk and Courtesy Officer teams, and overnight nursing and assisted living staff. Thank you for considering a gift to this fund!

#### **AFIO Chapter Meeting**

Intelligence presentations by the San Antonio Chapter of The Association of Former Intelligence Officers will resume on Monday, November 4 at 12pm in the Roadrunner Lounge. The presentation will be on the Israeli and Gaza War, providing us with background and insights from the faculty of the Naval War College. The Naval War College (NWC or NAVWARCOL in Navy talk) is the staff college and "Home of Thought" for the United States Navy. The NWC educates and develops leaders, supports defining the future Navy and associated roles and missions, supports combat readiness, and strengthens global maritime partnerships. More than 50,000 students have graduated since its first class of 9 students in 1885. About 300 of today's activeduty admirals, generals, and senior executive service leaders are alumni. #### "Antenna" ~ Betty Overacker

The most important component in any ham radio station is the antenna. The antenna can increase the distance a radio can communicate and can also improve the reception quality. Consequently, ham radio operators strive to improve their antennas. Don Spoon, the BST-E Amateur Radio Club President, arranged an antenna seminar via ZOOM by Dr. Ed Fong, who is an electrical engineering professor at the University of California at Santa Cruz. #### 2024 Tax Prep by AARP/IRS Certified Preparers – New Resident Issues

This month we would like to address the tax situation for all those who are new residents. Most new residents are facing a situation beyond the mere introduction to our AARP/IRS Tax Prep program. There are one-time issues and continuing yearly benefits associated with living at a non-profit community like Blue Skies.

In the first place as a resident of this community part of your monthly fees are considered by the IRS as prepaid qualified medical expenses and therefore eligible to deduct. Each year the Blue Skies CFO reviews the books to determine the actual rate for that tax year. The rate varies yearly, but averages around 30%. The CFO will publish an official letter to residents in December to announce the rate for the preceding year. Your allowable



deduction is equal to the sum of your basic monthly charge times the rate for that year (e.g., 30% of \$30,000, or \$9,000). Given your other itemized deductions, this may help you to exceed the Standard Deduction.

The good news for new residents is that this long-term medical deduction rate also applies to your initial buy-in cost when you moved into Blue Skies. This one-time deduction can be considerable and will often take the new resident well above the Standard Deduction for that first year (e.g., 30% of \$250,000, or \$75,000).

The second issue facing many new residents is the tax implications of selling their primary residence. Whenever you sell a home, you face the potential capital gain associated with the difference between the cost you originally paid for the home versus the price you received from the sale. As a taxpayer you want to minimize that capital gain. When you sell your last home to enter Blue Skies you can no longer roll over the sale into the purchase of a new home. However, you are eligible to take a one-time claim of a maximum write-off of \$250K for a single filer, or \$500K for a joint return. Some folks will find that is not enough to cover the full gain they have realized. However, the homeowner can further deduct the expense of "improvements" that



were made to the property while they owned it. Think of adding a swimming pool, replacing windows, remodeling, etc. Basic maintenance of the property does not count. Therefore, a new resident who sold their home when they came to Blue Skies needs to know how much they paid for the home they sold, how much they were paid at sale, and the costs of improvements they made to the property while they owned it.
