Hot Asphalt and Dog Paws: What You Need to Know During Warm Months

Asphalt can heat up quickly and pose a serious risk to your dog's paws — even if the air temperature feels comfortable to you. How Hot Is Too Hot?

If the air temperature is 85°F, asphalt can reach 130°F or more in direct sunlight. At 125°F, skin destruction can occur in 60 seconds.

At 135°F, it's painful on contact. Tip: If it's too hot for your bare fee it's too hot for theirs!

However, please note that moving forward, the front desk will no longer be managing or overseeing this program. Dryers in the Towers - Why Cleaning the Lint Trap Matters

Proper dryer maintenance starts with one simple but crucial step: cleaning the lint trap. This small action plays a big role in your dryer's performance and safety. Failing to clean it—or not inserting it properly—can lead to serious issues:

Fire Hazard: Lint is highly flammable. A buildup in the lint trap or dryer vents significantly increases the risk of fire.

Machine Malfunction: Operating the dryer without the lint trap in place can cause small items (like socks or undergarments) to be pulled into the internal blower, damaging components and potentially leading to system failure or fire.

Overheating & Inefficiency: A clogged lint trap restricts airflow, causing the dryer to overheat and run inefficiently leading to longer drying times and higher energy use.

Quick Tips

Clean the lint trap before or after every load. Ensure the lint trap is securely in place before starting the dryer.

By keeping the lint trap clean and properly inserted, you help ensure that:
Your clothes dry thoroughly.
The machine operates efficiently.
You reduce the risk of costly repairs or dangerous fire hazards.
Taking a few seconds to clean the lint trap

Taking a few seconds to clean the lint trap each time you use the dryer can prevent costly repairs and improve safety for everyone in the Towers. Thank you for doing your part to keep our shared spaces safe and efficient!

Sighting of a Snake on Campus or in a Resident's Home:

- · Leave the snake alone!
- · Calmly take a few steps backward
- Observe the snake's markings and direction the snake goes and then calmly walk away
- · Vacate the area if able
- Call the Front Desk or Maintenance (if there is a sighting)

It's HOT in Texas! The Texas heat wave isn't going anywhere for a while so please be sure to drink plenty of water and avoid the heat as much as possible. To avoid the heat, consider going out before 9am or after 7pm, exercise with a friend for safety, avoid the outdoors in the early afternoon (about noon to 3pm) when the sun is the strongest, dress in lightweight light-colored clothing and wear a hat and sunglasses.

Summer is coming to an end, but these scams will never end – Ashlie Maltos

Have you received a text message from "Texas Vehicle Administration" (DMV) for a final notice or enforcement begins on a certain date? The message then states that their records show that as of today, you still have an outstanding traffic ticket. According to Texas car traffic regulations 560-10-22, if you do not pay by a certain date, they will take the following actions:

- 1. Report to the DMV violation database
- 2. Suspend your vehicle registration effective a certain month
- 3. Suspend driving privileges for 30 days
- 4. Impose a 35% service fee if paid at toll location
- 5. You may be prosecuted, and your credit score will be affected

The message then asks you to reply with "Y" and to reopen the message to click the link or paste it in your browser. DO NOT fall for this! Immediately, delete this message and do not respond to it. This is a way for the scammers to get into your cell phone or computer to obtain all your personal information.

Furniture Thrift Store (FTS) Donations: Dos and Don'ts

We welcome donations to the BSTW Furniture Thrift Store. Residents are advised to follow these guidelines to ensure a smooth delivery of their donations to their destination. Comply with the following:

Contact or coordinate with an FTS Volunteer before making any donation to ensure only acceptable items are brought to the store and a volunteer is available to receive them. Refer to the bottom of this article for a list of FTS Volunteers (see resident directory for contact information).

We will provide residents with a list of companies that can assist with the transportation of "Approved" items to the store at the time coordinated between you and the volunteer.

Unacceptable items can be removed by one of these companies at your expense; Goodwill, Salvation Army, Habitat for Humanity, etc., or you can drop off at the nearest location.

Do not leave donated furniture or other donated items outside Rooms 110 and 112. Coordination with the volunteers is the best way to donate your not-needed household goods.

Donations are accepted only on the dates and at the times posted unless coordination is made with a volunteer.

The FTS is no longer able to accept electronics of any kind.

Payment is due upon purchase via cash, check, or credit card. Purchased items must be removed promptly unless an arrangement is made with an FTS volunteer. All items sold as is; all sales are final; no returns or refunds.

The FTS operates every other Friday for sales, unless otherwise noted. The operating dates are posted on calendars in Rooms 110 and 112.

The regular operating hours of the FTS are 8am-12pm

If you attended the presentations by Dr. Sudha Seshadri and the research scientists from the Glenn Biggs Institute at UT Health, you would not want to miss this presentation.

Dr. Neela Patel, MD, MPH, CMD is Chief, Division of Geriatrics and Supportive Care at UT Health San Antonio and is the new Chief Medical Officer for Blue Skies of Texas. Dr. Patel holds a joint appointment as Associate Professor, Geriatrician and Palliative Care Expert at the Glenn Biggs Institute for Alzheimer's and Neurodegenerative Diseases at UT Health SA. She was instrumental with the team at the Biggs Institute in starting comprehensive care for persons with dementia--a multidisciplinary clinic to include Neurology, Psychiatry, Social Work and Palliative Care. Dr. Patel will speak about the behavioral aspects of Alzheimer's and other dementias.

Included will be a discussion of the many significant financial and legal issues and decisions faced when a loved one is diagnosed with dementia. To close will be an inside look at Freedom House - insights into what life is like for residents.


The Y'all Means All 5K in Lady Bird Johnson Park was held on 14 June, resulting in Pat Perry receiving a 3d place age group award.

Free Parking at San Antonio Airport

If your vehicle has Texas license plates with a Disabled Veteran (DV) or eligible Meritorious Military Honors designation that was issued by the Texas Department of Motor Vehicles, you can park up to 30 days for free at San Antonio airport.

The procedure is easy:

Drive In - Park - Drive Out (through a "Cashier Lane")

Requirements:

- Vehicle owner must be present at time of exiting.
- Vehicle must have a permanently affixed license plate with the specialty plate.
- Driver must show a valid driver's license or Military ID card.
- Driver must show a copy of the current vehicle registration renewal receipt.
- Driver must show a completed Parking Validation Form (see the form below). The Parking Validation Form is also available from the Cashier and can be filled out then, if you haven't filled out one in advance.

Four of us went to Luigi's Italian Restaurant
for dinner on a Tuesday evening in July. This
is the same restaurant that used to be in
Castroville, but has since moved into a nicer
building in Lacoste - not all that far from Blue
Skies.

Luigi's specializes in southern Italian cooking, so they use lots of tomatoes. On our outing, the food was quite good, and the price was quite reasonable given the cost of food today.

In addition to various pastas and pizzas, they also offer Hero sandwiches - your choice of sausage and peppers, eggplant parmesan, meatball parmesan, etc. The pastas are also good - including a Luigi's Special with three pastas - Lasagna, Manicotti and Beef Ravioli. Two of us had the Special, one of us had eggplant rollatini, and the other had sausage and peppers with rigatoni. Luigi's also offers various seafood entrees - salmon, shrimp fra diavolo, shrimp scampi, and shrimp alfredo. Overall, the food was very good, with a large number of dishes from which to choose, and they make their own cannoli dessert. It's definitely worth a visit if you want some good Italian food.


